The Global Agenda and the Targets to be achieved by 2030

Education is the foundation of any society on which dreams of economic growth and development are built. Its role is not only limited to boosting economic growth by enhancing skills and opening up opportunities for sustainable livelihoods, but also to enable people to lead a life of dignity. Goal 4 aims to ensure inclusive, equitable and quality education for all, including technical and vocational training by providing lifelong learning opportunities, so as to achieve substantial adult literacy and numeracy. It also aims to build and upgrade education facilities that are child, disability and gender sensitive and ensure that all learners acquire knowledge and skills needed to promote sustainable Development.

The targets to be achieved by 2030 are as follows:

- **4.1** By 2030, ensure that all girls and boys complete free, equitable and quality primary and secondary education leading to relevant and effective learning outcomes.
- **4.2** By 2030, ensure that all girls and boys have access to quality early childhood development, care and pre-primary education so that they are ready for primary education.
- **4.3** By 2030, ensure equal access for all women and men to affordable and quality technical, vocational and tertiary education, including university.
- **4.4** By 2030, substantially increase the number of youth and adults who have relevant skills, including technical and vocational skills, for employment, decent jobs and entrepreneurship.
- **4.5** By 2030, eliminate gender disparities in education and ensure equal access to all levels of education and vocational training for the vulnerable, including persons with disabilities, indigenous peoples and children in vulnerable situations.

4. Strategy to realize the Sustainable Development Goals.

Overall, the Government of Punjab is working towards building a system which ensures that educational programmes are made accessible, inclusive and responsive to the needs of diverse group of children and young people, with a special focus on students from disadvantaged population groups. It will ensure that social, regional and gender gaps in education are eliminated and that gender equality and girls' and women's empowerment are promoted throughout the education system. By expanding opportunities for skill development and ensuring acquisition by young people and adults of the skills and competencies for life and work, Punjab will benefit from a population with an increased skill capacity that is better able to embrace the modern economy. To implement this kind of educational system, the Government of Punjab needs to invest further in systems for teacher development and management, so that they are better able to respond to regional needs concerning quantity and quality. It also aims at institutionalizing a responsive, participatory and accountable system of educational planning, governance and management.

To achieve the SDG-4 which relates to education, the Punjab is focusing on the following aspects of school education which will lead to achievement of various subgoals spelt out under SDG-4

- Pre-school Education
- "Each one Bring one"
- 'Padho Punjab Padhao Punjab'
- English as a medium of instruction
- Digitalization of Education
- Value Education and protecting children from bad habits
- Sports Policy 2018
- Skill in education and employability
- Removing Gender disparity in access to school education
- Special residential schools for poor and meritorius students
- Reforms in the working of State Education Board

5. Details of the planned Interventions, Schemes and Projects with indicators.

The Government of India duly recognizes the challenges faced by the education sector in the country and has come up with various innovative programmes that address the various needs and issues. To achieve this, a comprehensive programme, **Samagra Shiksha**, has been envisaged with the aim of improving effectiveness of schools and providing equal educational opportunities to all. It has subsumed three previously existing schemes: **Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA)** and **Teacher Education (TE)**. The objective is also to enhance use of digital technology in education.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan launched in the year 2001-02 continues to be India's main programme for universal elementary education. The interventions under SSA include building of school infrastructure, provisioning for teachers, periodic teacher training and academic resource support, making available learning resources for children like text books, computers, libraries, etc. To ensure equal learning opportunities for all, includible and the poor, residential schools for girls known as Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalayas have been set up, and local level accountability has been established by engaging with community based organizations. The Mid-day Meal scheme is aimed at increasing enrolment in primary schools as well as improving the nutritional status of primary school children.

The country moved to a right-based education framework with the implementation of **Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education (RTE) Act 2009**. This right gives a legal obligation on the Central and State governments to provide and ensure admission, attendance and completion of elementary education by all children in the 6-14 years age group. In addition, to improve access to secondary education, **Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan** was launched in 2009 to achieve an enrolment rate of 75 percent at secondary school level by providing a secondary school within reasonable distance of habitation.

The state of Punjab implemented these programmes of Government of India and has initiated various state specific programmes to address its various needs and issues. The various schemes and programmes implemented in the education sector impacting the achievement of SDGs in Punjab are briefly described in the ensuing section

Quality education linked with enhancing learning outcomes

- **Pre-school Education**: The department has taken a historical step by introducing pre-primary classes in government primary schools to develop school readiness among learners at early age. Apart from enhancing enrolment in govt. schools, this initiative would also lead to improvement in the learning levels of our students in govt. schools. Pre-Primary sections have been started in all the government schools in the academic session 2018-19 around 1.73 lacs children have been enrolled in pre-primary classes.
- "Each one Bring one" an enrollment drive campaign has been started from 18th December, 2018 by involving community, State and district education officers, school heads and teachers etc. This campaign will be carried throughout the year. Due to this drive, around 30000 students have been admitted in govt. schools in December 2018/January 2019.
- 'Padho Punjab Padhao Punjab' which is a Learning Enhancement Programme (LEP) is implemented in all government schools from classes 1st to 8th to ensure age and class appropriate levels of learning of students in a time bound manner. Under this programme the students' learning is assessed and they are put into different groups as per their learning levels. Teachers have been trained to use activity based teaching learning techniques to improve the learning levels of the students and move them to the next higher level of learning group in a time bound manner. The results show that the students learning levels have improved satisfactorily through this LEP. Now the PPPP has also been extended upto 12th classes.
- English as a medium of instruction has been introduced in 2800 primary schools and 2387 Govt. middle/high/Sen. Secondary schools. At present 43113 students have adopted English as a medium of instruction. The remaining schools would be covered in a phased manner.
- Digitalization of education: In order to enhance efficient transaction of school curriculum with the help of modern ICT Technology, the State of Punjab has been focusing developing ICT infrastructure in schools of Punjab. As many as 261 schools have been converted into smart schools which cover all education blocks of the Punjab State. Apart from these 261 smart schools which are provided grant by the state, more than 2425 schools have been converted into smart schools with the efforts of school heads, school staff, CSR/NGOs/NRIs and the local communities. These schools have modern facilities like smart classrooms, solar power systems, well equipped laboratories and libraries, aesthetic buildings, sports

equipments, adequate furniture. The content relating to the prescribed school curriculum has been converted into e-form which is made available to all schools. Soft copies of the textbooks have been uploaded on the official website of the state education board.

- Value Education and protecting children from bad habits: Apart from the focus on the academic learning of children in schools, the state of Punjab has initiated various programs like making school children aware of ill effects of drugs, and how to be protective from the incidences of sexual abuse. The school curriculum contains contents relating to sensitising our students about human rights, gender equality promotion of a culture of peace and non violence, global citizenship and appreciation of cultural diversities within India and at the global level.
- Sports Policy 2018 The school system should offer wholesome learning and other activities for overall personality development of the students. Govt. of Punjab has made Sports Policy 2018 vide which sports and physical activities have been made inseparable part of school activities. In addition, it also involves students in various types of co-curricular activities for fostering creative and other potentialities of the students.
- During current session 2018-19, free text books have already been provided to all students of govt. and govt. aided schools from class 1st to 12th.
- Education Improvement Committees (*Sikhya Sudhar Kameties*) have been formed to uplift the school performance by providing on-site support to teachers and addressing the issues of schools. These committees consist of experts of different subjects as also that of administrative matters of schools. These committees visit the schools and on the basis of their observations of various school processes provide on-site support to improve them.
- Skill in education and employability Govt. of Punjab has focused on developing relevant vocational skills in school students by introducing various technical vocational courses by duly integrating them with school curriculum and at the same time aligning them to the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) so that the students can get decent jobs or start their own entrepreneurship after completing such courses in India and abroad. At the moment as many as 11 trades have been started in 780 schools and nearly 92000 students have opted for these courses at different levels of their schooling.

- Removing Gender disparity in access to school education: The State of Punjab is very touchy about the education of girls in the State. Apart from providing various State and Centrally sponsored scholarship schemes for girls to incentivizing their education, the State has started schemes like providing them free bicycles, self defense trainings, sanitary napkins, creating facilities like separate toilets for girls, placing incinerators in schools etc. Motivational camps are also organized for parents and community members to enlighten them about the significance of girls' education. 22 KGBVs and 21 girls hostels have been established in educationally backward blocks to facilitate the education of the girls belonging to poor and backward areas.
- Special Residential Schools for poor and Meritorious students: The Punjab has set up society of Meritorious Schools. As many as 10 residential schools have been opened in different parts of Punjab to provide quality education to poor and meritorious students of Punjab. The education is totally free in these schools and students are provided free boarding and lodging facilities.
- Reforms in the working of State Education Board: The Punjab School Education Board has taken following initiatives for improving its performance:-
 - (i) Board exams certificates are now issued in online mode.
 - (ii) Corrections in date of birth in the certificates have been allowed irrespective of the year in which certificate was issued. Earlier the correction could have been made within 5 years of issuing the certificates resulting in large number of affected person taking resort to filing cases in court.
 - (iii) In order to expedite the task of preparation of result of board classes, a mobile app has been prepared for uploading and computation of marks of the paper by the paper examiner. The results of 2018 were declared with in one month of completion of board exams.
 - (iv) In order to check the menace of copying, exam centre are formed at schools other than the one where students are studying. Installation of video cameras in sensitive centers has been done to prevent copying. Strict action is being taken against teachers and students for copying.
 - (v) All text books of PSEB have been placed on-line for convenience of students.
 - (vi) The data/certificates of board exams held by PSEB in March 2018 have been digitized and included in the National Academic Depository.

6. Key Performance Parameter for key Personnel

The department had identify measurable key performance parameter (KPP) for key personnel working in the department of School Education. The Key Performance parameters (KPP) based system would help in evaluating the performance of concerned personnel and would also act as incentive for achievement of KPPs. The information on e-performance parameters for key personnel vis-a-vis various targets spelt out under SDG 4 for different years is contained in Annexure-3.

7. Monitoring of Progress

The Department has made 4 years strategic plan (Annexure-1). The progress will be regularly monitored at the level of Secretary School Education. The data on various indicators will be get duly validated and audited by 3rd party where required.
